The best... Brunches

It's (sort of) the most important meal of the day. Especially in New York, where we love to head to **Clinton Street Baking** on the Lower East Side. Thought blueberry pancakes couldn't get any naughtier? Try them here with warm maple butter (below; clintonstreetbaking.com).

When it comes to weekend brunch in London, the unconventionally fabulous **Berber & Q** in Hackney pulls a slam-dunk every time. Instead of fry-ups, expect Turkish poached eggs with fresh yoghurt and paprika, shakshuko (eggs poached in tomato-chilli sauce) with a killer red pepper jam, and epic cocktails and lemonades (berberando.com).

Talk ng of epic, just look at Al Qasr in Dubai: rearing gold Arabian horses guard its entrance, while blue marble and vast chandeliers lie within. Down the sweeping staircase, Friday's all-you-can-eat-and-drink spreads last into the evening, with everything from sushi to Spanish cheeses, stir-fries to

chocolate fountains. If you want alcohol included, it's £105 a head — which seems pricey, but it really is an entire day out (jumeirah.com).

In Tulum, we had the best huevos rancheros ever at Zamas. It's not just the huge portions, crunchy tortillas, perfectly seasoned beans, just-so fried eggs, zingy salsa or even the creamy avocado. What makes it special is that you can eat slowly, sitting in the shade of a wooden deck by the beach, with a lazy monitor lizard basking on the rocks for company (zamas.com).

In Prague, brunch at Radost FX is expat-arama — everywhere Americans scribble furiously in battered Moleskines, pretending they're the next Hemingway. The atmosphere is the best bit, but we never say no to its 'honeymooner', either — homemade waffles with fresh fruit and whipped cream, home fries on the side, and two glasses of Champagne to wash it all down (radost fx. cz).
